LEEKFRITH is an extensive township, between two branches of the river Churnet, and comprising 7500 acres, 877 souls, many scattered houses, and the hamlets of POOL END, 1 ¼ mile N.W.; WHITE'S BRIDGE, where there is a large dye-house, half a mile N.W.; ABBEY GREEN, half a mile N.; MEERBROOK, 3 miles N.; BLACKSHAW MOOR, 3 miles N.N.W.; and UPPER HULME, 4 miles N.N.W. of Leek. At Abbey Green are the remains of an ancient abbey, noticed at page 720, and a Bowling-green. The abbey farm is the property of John Davenport, Esq. At the north end of the township are the moorland farms of Gunside, Rochside, and Hazlewood. As noticed at page 719, Leekfrith is in the Earl of Macclesfield's manor of Leek, but most of the soil belongs to William Brocklehurst, Esq., John Davenport, Esq., and many smaller freeholders. Upper or Over Hulme gave birth to Richard Caldwell, an eminent physician, who died in 1515. It has a silk mill in the dale, below the lofty mountain rocks, called Leek Roches, (see page 52,) where, some years ago, an immense mass of rocks fell in such a manner as to leave under it large cavern, which has since been occupied as a dwelling by a poor aged woman. Meerbrook Chapelry includes most of Leekfrith township. Its CHAPEL (St. Matthew,) was built and endowed by Sir Ralph Bagnall, who vested it with seven trustees, by deed, dated February, 2nd, 1564. It has about 250 sittings, mostly free. The living is a perpetual curacy, valued at £110, in the patronage of the Vicar of Leek, and incumbency of the Rev. James Turner, M.A., who rebuilt the Parsonage House, in 1828, and in 1845 settled upon the succeeding incumbents five acres of land and two buildings, at Roche Grange, for preaching additional sermons. Mr. William Condlyffe, of Leek, is heir-at-law of one of the original chapel trustees, and has an estate at Upper Hulme, which has been held by his family since 1647. John Stoddard, in 1673, bequeathed out of his lands at Thornyleigh and Leekfrith, three yearly rent-charges, viz., £4 to the curate of Meerbrook, £10 to a schoolmaster for teaching 20 poor children of that chapelry, and £2 for the poor of Gunside. In 1679, Edmund Brough left out of his lands at Peakstones, 50 shillings yearly to the curate of Meerbrook, and 20 shillings to the poor of Rocheside and Hazlewood. Roger Morris gave £100, and directed one-half of the interest to be given to the schoolmaster, for the education of eight poor children of Leekfrith, and the other for a distribution of bibles. The interest, £4 10 shillings, is paid out of the rent of Swines Moor Farm. Thomas Wood left £30, for which 30 shillings is now paid yearly out of Stock Meadow Farm, and distributed in bread among the poor of the liberty of Meerbrook.
